

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## Rector's Report

April 2023

#### Dear Friends,

In our service on Easter Sunday this year, we were encouraged by that moment a distressed Mary Magdalene met with the risen Lord Jesus at side of the empty tomb. It is a beautiful moment which captures the intimacy of their relationship, and reminds us that Jesus isn't some distant uncaring figure but that he is the good shepherd who calls his own sheep by name and they recognise his voice - the good shepherd who laid down his life for his sheep.

I always find it striking that Jesus could have gone straight to his heavenly Father at this point, his saving work complete, but instead he chose to go and comfort Mary in her distress. It's an

incredible moment. The good shepherd who hadn't disappeared forever, but who after three days had risen again and who was there for her – in her despair and anguish. His coming was the banishing of her sadness and fear as she hurried back to the disciples to tell them the good news.

But it wasn't just Mary that Jesus was there for. The whole point of the resurrection is that we too can meet Jesus today through his Spirit and by faith and that because of the resurrection, we can have the same intimate relationship with Jesus as our Saviour.

And the encounter we can have is no less life-changing. In the same way that Mary went from sadness to joy, the gospel still comes to transform, broken, sorrowful and fearful lives with sheer joy and gladness at meeting Jesus, alive with us today. Each one of us has the invitation to meet with him and to respond to him in our hearts with joy, praise and thanks. He has laid down his life for each one of us, and welcomes each one of us to himself now. He longs to transform our lives, to life afresh in light of the resurrection and it is this transformation that is at the heart of the Christian experience.

At our recent Vision Sunday, we reflected on the amazing promise that Jesus gives in John 15:5, where Jesus says, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit." It is a promise that calls us as Christians not to strive to do more, but to know Jesus better as we seek to remain in him, and that as we do so, we can expect to bear much fruit for the kingdom. I am excited about seeing this vision further realised at All Saints over the coming years and my hope is that the whole church family will be involved in shaping how in God's strength we seek to achieve this.

Whilst the disruption linked to COVID-19 has all but subsided, we have entered a new period of uncertainty in the wider Church of England. A number of big questions remain with regard to the Bishops' proposals which seek to go against the Bible's teaching on issues related to human sexuality and see a change to the Church's doctrine of marriage, and we will have to navigate them alongside others who seek to uphold the Word of God over the coming months. However, whilst we do this, we must not take our eyes off Jesus or our mission to Know Christ and Make Him Known here in Riseley and beyond.

It is a mission that I know many have enjoyed being a part of over the past 12 months, with so many people serving the gospel in so many ways. Having not held a holiday club for over five years, we have held two in under a year, which a large number of the church family have got behind to make possible. New weekly initiatives such as Roots, Shoots & Fruits and the Bus-Stop Café, have started up as we have looked to help our young people Know Christ and Make Him Known, alongside Junior Jivers, Youth Club and SOUL which this year have all taken a step forward and seen some encouraging growth.

Home-groups offering fellowship and discipleship have continued to meet and the Warm Spaces Initiative in response to the "cost of living crisis" provided a new opportunity for us to reach out with the love of Christ. Kathryn Staniforth has not only taken on the role of Church Warden this past year, but has also agreed to

coordinate pastoral care across the church. Please pray for Kathryn and support her in this role, and if you are aware of any needs related to pastoral care, please do not be afraid to speak to her.

The Jubilee celebrations followed by the poignant moment of the death of Queen Elizabeth II provided us opportunity to both celebrate and grieve alongside the wider community, as have the annual fixtures in the church calendar of Harvest, Remembrance Sunday and Christmas. We had a wonderful time in October when Giles and Sarah Walter joined us for our first weekend at home since 2019 and look forward to running the weekend again 7<sup>th</sup> - 8<sup>th</sup> October 2023 when Hugh Palmer will be with us – please make sure you have the dates in your diary!

Sunday Morning Services, Midweek Coffee Morning Services, Brook House Services and Prayer Meetings have all helped us in

our mission as disciples of Christ, and many hours of service 'behind the scenes' have been put in by so many to enable all these initiatives to take place week by week, month by month, throughout the year. It has been wonderful to see people using the gifts God has given them to bless others and bring him glory.

Whilst we have so much to be thankful to God for, I cannot finish this letter without remembering a number of faithful sisters from among us who went to be with Jesus this past year. Jean Morgan-Jones, Beryl Wallis, Margaret Ward, Mary Skevington and Jill Shaw all themselves Knew Christ and Made Him Known Amongst us, and we thank God for their friendship, their witness and their service over many years at All Saints. Because of the resurrection, we look forward with confidence to the day when we will be reunited with them face to face.

And so, as I draw to a close, let me say that this is just a small snapshot of the life of our church, with so much more going on as evidenced by all that's included in this report. Therefore, I would take this opportunity to thank you all for your ongoing partnership in the gospel. We have a great God and a wonderful mission as we look to Know Christ and Make Him Known in the year ahead.


#### Church Vision

  - (a) Their name is entered on the Church Electoral Roll of the Parish;
  - (b) They are an actual communicant which means that they have received communion according to the use of the Church of England or of a Church in communion with the Church of England at least 3 times during the 12 months preceding the date of the election; and
  - (c) They are of 18 years or upwards (for election to the Deanery Synod) or of 16 years or upwards (for election to the Parochial Church Council).

Throughout the year regular items on the agenda have been church mission, finance, safeguarding and the upkeep of the church building.

## Building and Fabric report

It has been great to see the building used widely during the past year for so many different activities at different times of the week. There is little to actually report on in terms of structural work or repairs in the church building as not much has happened since this time last year. Firstly I would like to thank Lesley who continues to keep the churchyard and the outside of the church so tidy and immaculate looking right through the year, it really is hugely appreciated. Thank you to the band of folk who keep the inside of the church tidy and clean on a weekly basis. Twice a year we do have tidy up sessions at the church and thank you again to those who help out with this. It is important to have a building that is clean and welcoming and this doesn't happen by itself!

On the negative side, we have had a continued low level of vandalism and antisocial behaviour by a small group of people who hang out inside the porch. Despite reasoning with them and occasional police involvement, this is still an issue. The external porch doors have been repaired and will be replaced soon and they will be locked unless the building is in use.

The ageing gas heating system is still limping on through each winter and just about keeps the building warm enough but heating old draughty church buildings whatever type of heating is installed is becoming dramatically more expensive. Warm coats are essential throughout the winter months!

We are still waiting for the stonemasons to carry out some minor repointing and repairs to the south west buttress which moved again during the dry summer of 2022. Hopefully this will be completed soon.

We have had discussions with our new architect David Llewellyn on further reordering of the space inside the church building and various options will be considered when the time is appropriate.

As stated in previous years, we do need to explore whether there might be opportunities for accessing a wider base of financial support for the church building from across the village and to seek potential grants that help to offset the considerable costs that are coming ahead. This is particularly important at a time when we are all going to be stretched financially. If anybody feels they have the skills and energy to drive this, please let James know!

In summary, we are blessed with a lovely welcoming and versatile church building that is used by so many groups throughout the week and for worshipping on a Sunday. I hope that in the future we can keep bringing the life changing Gospel message to people of all ages in a building where this has been happening for over 800 years.

We are lucky that very little damage is created by these creatures. However we did have a Whale visit in early spring but it now appears to have found deeper water!

A Key part of the churchyard life these last twelve months has been the work of a small

team maintaining the whole thing. However we must as before give a huge thank you to Lesley Deathe for her amazing work and dedication throughout the year making the whole area a place that people want to visit not just to see loved ones they have been parted from, but to be part of a well cared for area

of the village.

As always, we welcome people to enjoy in a respectful way this beautiful place and ask that dog owners keep their dogs on a lead and clean up after them. Also the use of rubbish bins and general care and respect will always be appreciated.

Looking ahead to 2024 it is hoped that we will plant more bulbs this autumn. Final decisions on placements are to be made but we will be looking at Snowdrops and Bluebells especially. Other wild flowers for the summer to encourage the bees are to be contemplated as well.

#### Financial Review

As can be seen from the accounts, 2022 was a relatively stable year with a small decrease in our overall funding from £20,912 to £20,479. The fact there was such a small overspend was due to very little needing to be spent on maintenance of the building, a number of generous donations, including another anonymous donation of £5,000. (Over the past few years, we have been fortunate to receive a number of donations of £5,000, but the one paid to the PCC in 2022 will be the last one.)

Taking everything into account, including a possible increase in our parish share payment to the diocese and assuming there will shortly be a considerable increase in heating/lighting costs, if there is no increase in overall giving, we will have a 2023 deficit of the order of £10,000, which is approximately half our current funds, and clearly that is not a sustainable position.

Without a material increase in overall giving, it may be necessary to consider reducing the PCC's donations to other charities and/or the parish share payment to the diocese, but we should pray and take action, to ensure that is not needed.

## Sharnbrook Deanery Synod



Sharnbrook Deanery consists of 30 parish churches in North Bedfordshire, which has a total population of around 30,000 people including around 8,000 under 18 years old. The Deanery Synod normally meets four times a year and consists of all members of the clergy and lay representatives from the churches, elected for a 3-year term. During 2022 the lay representatives for All Saints Church were Lynda and Brian Simister, and also Keith Williams as Lay Co-chair of the Deanery. Most of the meetings are open, so everyone is welcome to

attend, although only members are able to vote on resolutions.

Work on 'Re-imagining the Deanery' continued last year, with a particular focus on growing our mission and ministry to children, young people and families. The Listening to Young People initiative started five years ago and led to establishment of the Our Voice youth group. This met every month during 2022 and enjoyed a residential weekend at the Chellington Centre in September attended by 17 young people, including five from Riseley and Bletsoe.

During 2022 The Resources Cupboard was commissioned to review work with children, young people and families (CYF) across all the churches in the Deanery. This work was funded by a grant from the St Albans Diocese 'Reaching New People' team and highlighted the need for urgent action to achieve our vision - 'To share the Good News of Jesus with all children in North Bedfordshire, engaging mind, body and spirit.' This review identified some immediate needs and opportunities; helped the Steering Group to develop a strategy and action plan to support individual churches; and launched Deanery-wide initiatives in schools (led by Rev James Isaacs) and youth outreach (led by Keith Williams).

In 2023 a CYF support hub has been established with funding from personal donations; Deanery reserves; and a grant from Verulam House Fund Trust. This enables us to move forward with all these opportunities, with continuing support from The Resources Cupboard and others. Three top priorities are to:

- Deliver an Emerging Leaders course for young people in school years 10+ during summer half term, leading to a youth-led service on Saturday 10th June
- Develop a joined-up approach to growing Christian work in schools with other partners e.g., IMPACT and Good News for Everyone
- Create a mobile centre for youth outreach in smaller villages using a donated caravan; building on the experience of running Bus Stop Café in Riseley; and supported by Angler's Rest CYC

Please pray for God's continued provision and blessing, and particularly for volunteers to engage in these initiatives – And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." (Luke 10:2 ESV)

## Safeguarding

The care and protection of children, young people and vulnerable adults in our Church family is the responsibility of all who participate in the life of the church. In November we held a Safeguarding Sunday when we were reminded of our commitments to one another as stated in our Safeguarding policy.

- Promote a safer environment and culture
- Safely recruit and support all those with any responsibility related to children and vulnerable adults
- To respond promptly to every safeguarding concern or allegation
- Care pastorally for victims/survivors of abuse or other affected persons
- Care pastorally for those who are the subject of concerns/allegations of abuse and other affected persons
- Responding to those that may pose a present risk

To help us to understand how we should respond if we have any concerns that someone is at risk, or is being abused or presents a risk to others we are advised by the diocese to do an online Basic awareness course. This can be found at <a href="https://safeguardingtraining.cofeportal.org/">https://safeguardingtraining.cofeportal.org/</a> We hope, in the near future, to have an opportunity for people to do this course together.

The PCC have complied with the rules under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 concerning the mandatory training for clergy and they are all completed and in date.

If you do have safeguarding concerns, please speak to the Parish Safeguarding Officer, Lynda Simister. More information is displayed on a poster in Church and on our website.

On Safeguarding Sunday, we talked about our church being a safe place for everyone and we talked about ways that we try to ensure that this is true. We were encouraged by children who said that they did feel safe in church but they did know who to talk to if they had any worries. We pray that All Saints will indeed be a safe place for everyone but if there are any issues that they will be dealt with sensitivity following all the correct guidelines.

## Church as a Refuge

'Church as a Refuge' was originally the title of a one-day conference to help Christians understand abuse of power, how to make churches and Christian organisations safer places for everyone, and care for survivors. It started when Jacqui Wright invited Dr Diane Langberg to speak at a conference which was to be held at All Souls Church, London, in May 2020. This was stopped due to the Covid pandemic. Dr Langberg is an experienced Christian psychologist working with abuse and trauma victims in faith-based settings. See

The original conference became a two-day on-line event in June 2021, featuring not only Dr Langberg, but also six other expert speakers on related topics. The conference has reached about 700 people in 40 countries, across six continents. The 'Church as a Refuge Conference' is still available online.

In March 2022, Jacqui and Cliff were invited to speak at a one-day conference organised by All Souls at the 'Gospel and Abuse conference' with keynote speaker, Rachael Denhollander. Church as a Refuge current activities include:

- 1. Regular international 'think tanks' for Bible colleges, church leaders, and counsellors on raising awareness of the abuse of power in churches and Christian organisations, and healing trauma.
- 2. The 'think tank' has produced a training session designed to be delivered within three hours. You can read the materials, but please give us feedback so that we can improve them. Please email info@churchasarefuge.com
- 3. The 'think tank' has been working on Pastoral Care for survivors and understanding trauma. Currently, we have experts coming to speak to us about issues relating to the oppression of women in Christian environments.
- 4. Developing some questions based on Prof Scot McKnight's work on 'A Church called Tov'. ('Tov' is the Hebrew word for 'good'). The questions are conversation starters to evaluate how 'Tov' (or how good) a church is. If you want to use the questions just email us, but please give us feedback on them.
- 5. We have a bi-monthly meeting to help counsellors and therapists become trauma informed.
- 6. Listening to survivors of abuse in their search for safety and healing.
- 7. We have a monthly Monday evening online prayer meeting to pray about these issues in the church and our projects.



You and I are created to worship God! I wonder if our understanding of worship can be seen through C.S. Lewis's explanation in his Reflections on the Psalms.

He wrote: 'The most obvious fact about praise... strangely escaped me... I had never noticed that all enjoyment spontaneously overflows into praise... the world rings with praise... walkers praising the countryside, players praising their favourite game – praise of weather, wines, dishes, actors, horses, colleges, countries, historical personages, children, flowers, mountains, rare stamps, rare books, even sometimes politicians and scholars...

'I think we delight to praise what we enjoy because the praise not merely expresses but completes the enjoyment; it is its appointed consummation. It's not out of compliment that lovers keep on telling one another how beautiful they are; the delight is incomplete till it is expressed.'

In other words, worship is the consummation of joy. Our joy is not complete until it is expressed in worship. It is out of his love for you that God created you to worship. According to the Westminster Shorter Catechism, humankind's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy him for ever!

The 'action' started at 9.30am with, during the course of the day three big worship and teaching sessions — wonderful times all together worshipping God and then being challenged with great talks from Giles. The worship had an interesting extra twist, in that the screen with all the words on was at a suitable height for primary school pupils ... but proved a challenge to fully grown adults, so those standing sang from the sides so that those remaining seated could still see — it made no difference in the big scheme of things!!!

#### Bus Stop Café

The Bus Stop Café was launched on 12<sup>th</sup> January 2023 but the idea was floated, and all the preparatory work completed, in 2022.

The cafe provides a safe space for young people (year 7+) to meet after school on Thursday afternoons in the Village Hall Lounge - with food/drink, activities/games, music and an environment to get together and generally 'chill out'.

The initiative is run as a partnership between All Saints Church; Riseley Children's Centre & Community Hub (the Hub); and Riseley Parish Council - with each contributing financially and represented on the leadership team. All the necessary policies, procedures and risk assessments have been developed by the

team and the finances are managed and accounted for by the Hub as a registered charity.

By the end of March, the Café had been attended by 27 different young people. There are 12 volunteers on a rota as leaders/helpers (4 for each session) and all of them have had DBS clearance through the Hub, with Loreen Shelford acting as Safeguarding Officer.

#### Hope Explored

## Milsons – Valencia, Spain

Julian and Nicky Milson are missionaries in Valencia, Spain, along with Jemima (17) and Theo (15) their children. They have now been in Valencia for five years.

Julian is the Rector of the Anglican Church in Valencia which is part of the Reformed Episcopal Church of Spain. There's one Bishop (who is technically under the Archbishop of Canterbury) in Madrid and there are approximately 30 small congregations across the country. The Diocese of Spain works alongside the Church of England's Diocese in Europe.

Jim and Tanja French, Australian CMS Missionaries who run a theological training course called MOCLAM are part of the church family (and their two children) and they support us very

much as a family. Julian shares an office space with them and a local Spanish Christian journalist. In July, Chris and Rosy Redfearn and their daughter Lydia, a new Missionary family with Crosslinks, joined us. Chris is acting in the role of an informal Curate. Rosy now runs the Sunday School and closely supports individuals within the church

The past year has been a good one for us as a church and we saw growth at both the beginning and end of the year after the decline in attendance as a result of the pandemic. At times we have been very close to capacity, which has been an enormous encouragement to us all. Weekly attendance does tend to fluctuate but the trajectory appears to be upwards. Our Sunday School group consists of around 6 children. Most Sundays after the service there is an open invitation to join together to eat at a local (cheap!) pizzeria which helps us to continue fellowship late into the afternoon.

When people ask what our church is like, we usually describe it as a little taste of heaven. One of the reasons we say that is that there is a real sense of love and care for each other in our church family here. It is a true blessing from God and in the midst of lives full of various struggles; meeting on Sundays is a foretaste of the joy that awaits us in eternity. But another reason why our church is a glimpse of heaven is because we are so diverse. Old and young, men and women from at least 12 different countries come together to worship God and sing his praises.

In last year's report we mentioned how we had recently started a Youth Group and asked you pray for it. Thank you for praying! The group has worked really well with 8-12 young people attending. Recently we have moved to weekly meetings instead of fortnightly, one of the many things having the Redfearns here has given us the capacity to do.

In the Autumn term we tried a new evangelistic initiative to try to connect with people in the neighbourhood. We opened the church on Monday mornings, with a sign outside, to see if people would come in for coffee and a chat. Only one person came who was not already a member of our church family. So, we changed the time and day to try to connect with the people who were using the playground after school. Nobody came to the park! We decided to wait until the weather improves and there is more light in the afternoons. We plan to try again after Easter.

In December we had Christmas Carol services by candlelight. There were two services – one in English and one in Spanish. We had a god number of visitors to both services and there was little space for more people. It's always a very good opportunity to invite people and for the first time this year our next-door neighbours came!

Nicky's main role is to care for and support Jemima full time, and she is also continuing to learn Spanish when she has the time. She leads the music each week at church and plays the piano, is involved in planning All-Age services, leading the Youth Group, and hosting our mid-week bible study group.

#### Mission Support

Theo is studying hard at GCSEs (he is in Y10) and Spanish Studies at the British School and both children seem to be very settled. Jemima is learning 'life skills' and she spends a couple of hours per week with Rosy Redfearn.

#### Please pray:

- For plans to visit the UK this July, including a visit to Riseley.
- Our families in the UK, that they would know and follow Jesus as their Saviour.
- For our church family; that we would each grow deeper in our faith and that everyone would take up the challenge of evangelism.
- That the Youth Group will continue to flourish and that the young people will be equipped to serve Christ faithfully every day.
- That the Sunday School will grow.
- That our Gospel witness would produce fruit.
- That people would make meeting together a priority whether it be Sundays or mid-week.

Over the last year, Festive has seen a huge growth in our Student Network, which is the key area of our ministry. Prepandemic, we were reaching around 390 sixth form and college students across England and Wales. This number took a significant hit during the pandemic down to 200, as we were unable to meet with students at summer events. Fast forward to summer 2022 and we were involved in 5 different youth festivals where we met with hundreds of young people, resulting in us recruiting to our biggest student network yet at around 450 students.

Thankfully, by God's grace, he knew ahead of time the growth we'd experience and provided us with more recruits to our

Student Engagement (SE) Team than we've ever seen in one summer! Karen Jones does an incredible job managing our SE Team, a wonderful bunch of 15 volunteers. She keeps them motivated, encourages them in their own walk with Jesus and generally makes sure that they feel a part of Festive's mission when they write to and pray for the young people on their contact list.

But why is this growth so exciting? It means we are able to equip and inspire so many more sixth form and college students to live for Jesus, share the Good News and generally be shining lights where they study. The students in our network represent around 320 different sixth forms and colleges and we pray that each one would be impacted by the life of the one or two bold Christians who are praying and doing

mission there. It's been amazing to meet a number of these students in person and online at evangelism training events that we've run (Scattered www.festive.org.uk/scattered) and been a part of (Amplify www.amplifyacademy.co.uk).




